

Advanced Placement ®: The Basics

- AP® courses are college-level courses offered in high school that reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses
- Students take AP Exams at the end of the course to measure their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP Exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college
- *NEW FOR TEXAS HB 1992*: All students earning a score of 3
 or higher on an AP exam will receive college credit for that
 course in Texas public colleges and universities.




The Pinnacle of Distinction – AP Capstone Diploma™

AP Seminar Overview

AP Seminar is a foundational course that engages students in cross-curricular conversations that explore the complexities of academic and real-world topics and issues by analyzing divergent perspectives.

Students learn how to:

- Investigate academic and real-world topics from multiple perspectives
- Gather and analyze information from various sources
- Develop credible and valid evidence-based arguments
- Conduct research and evaluate evidence
- Collaborate in teams
- Communicate using appropriate media

Teachers and students typically select 2-4 topics for the course.

AP Research

AP Seminar is a prerequisite to AP Research, which is taken in 12th grade.

Students learn how to:

- Design, plan, and conduct a yearlong mentored, research-based investigation
- Apply research methods and practices to address a real-world topic selected by the student
- Write a college-level research paper
- Present and orally defend research findings and methodology

Exam score based on:

- Academic Paper
 (4,000 5,000 words)
 - 4,000 5,000 words • 75%



- 2. Presentation and Oral Defense
 - 25%
 - Student-chosen format
 - 3-5 Questions from a panel of ≥ 2 evaluators

Components of the Academic Thesis Paper

Required Component	Description
Introduction	Introduces and contextualizes the research question
Literature Review	Synthesizes information and perspectives related to the research question
Method	Explains the rationale of research method
Analysis & Evaluation	Analyzes and interprets the evidence
Conclusion & Reflection	Illustrates a cogent argument and a clear line of reasoning based on evidence provided, and reflects on the research project and the implications of the conclusion(s) reached
Bibliography	Lists all sources cited and consulted

AP Capstone: The Benefits

- Earn Distinction Stand out in the college admission process and have the opportunity to earn valuable college credit or placement
- Acquire Critical Skills Students acquire challenging college-level analysis, writing, and research skills that are increasingly valued by colleges
- **Choose what to study –** Students choose their own research topic and study issues and topics of interest and importance to them


